Korean American Community Services (KACS) was established in 1972 by a group of concerned community members seeking solutions to the acute problems of growing numbers of Korean immigrants. Since then, KACS has grown from one part-time employee to a staff of more than 60 and an annual operating budget of more than \$2.5 million.

KACS exists to serve Korean Americans and others who are in need of social, psychological, educational and/ or economic support and to provide assistance so that all members of our community may fulfill their needs and live dignified, meaningful lives.

KACS currently serves more than 7,500 clients per year through comprehensive services across the life cycle, including:

- Crisis intervention
- Public health and benefits
- Citizenship and immigration assistance
- Employment counseling and placement
- Senior counseling and housing management
- Pro bono legal clinic

- Youth community technology programs

## Words of Acknowledgment

It is a blessing to be entrusted with the confidence of the community to deliver varied community services in the past 36 years and continue expanding the service frontier of the Korean community.

The Korean community boundary has shifted from mono-ethnicity to multi-ethnicity, and from mono-generation to multi-generation especially as the early cohorts of the second-generation are reaching adulthood and our third-generation children are being born. # Early Childhood Center

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KACS values our children as the future leaders of our community. The KACS Early Childhood Center (ECC), formerly known as the KACS Child Care Center, was founded in 1979. Since then, the ECC has offered a multicultural and fun learning experience for children in a year-round program. Parents drop off their children every morning knowing that their children will learn and make friends each day in a safe and healthy environment. Working with nearly 100 children a year, bilingual and bicultural ECC staff provide culturally enriching learning opportunities that prepare children for success.

Certified teachers at the ECC use the Creative Curriculum, which focuses on the four child development categories of social/emotional, cognitive, physical, and linguistic development in English as well as the child's home language (Korean and Spanish). With support from Chicago Public Schools Community Partnership Program, our teachers are returning to the classroom themselves, improving their skills and working toward Type 04 certification. The ECC also offers family counseling, health and nutrition screenings, and parenting education workshops.

The KACS ECC is accredited by the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC) as a provider of high-quality early childhood education. ECC is working towards launching a two-year old toddler program in the community with the support of the Chicago Department of Children and Youth Services and Chicago Public Schools.

One of the cornerstones of KACS, the Core Services Department provides immigration, employment and housing resource programs for the community. Since its inception, KACS has maintained its commitment to ensuring that immigrants of the Chicago metropolitan area have access to the resources necessary to become contributing, civic-minded members of the community.

KACS has assisted Korean immigrants with immigration applications for nearly 30 years and currently serves over 500 Koreans annually with applications for citizenship, permanent residency, work permits, and sponsorship of relatives. KACS is a community partner in the New Americans Initiative, an unprecedented state program administered by the Illinois Coalition for Immigrant and Refugee Rights (ICIRR) as well as a delegate agency in implementing the Refugee and Immigrant Citizenship Initiative (RICI) of Illinois Department Human Services, both to help Koreans to become the U.S. citizens in Illinois.

In the past ten years, KACS has assisted over 2,500 immigrants in the citizenship process through application assistance, citizenship classes, workshops, legal screenings, interpretation, advocacy, and other related services. Core Services staff also advocate for inclusive immigration legislation with elected officials and policymakers. In the near future, KACS plans to acquire Board of Immigration Appeals (BIA) accreditation to provide even more comprehensive, quality services to the community.

The Workforce Development program at KACS offers a wide variety of employment services in English, Spanish and Korean to help clients find jobs suitable to their skills and interests. Since its founding in 1972, KACS has placed over 10,000 job seekers in gainful employment. Resources for job seekers include job fairs, held twice a year with over 25 employers, and access to training opportunities. In the coming year, Core Services will pursue strategies to maximize workforce potential by providing support to Korean- and Latino-owned businesses.

Core Services also provide housing information, workshops, tax clinics, and money management seminars for the entire community.

# Public Health Annual Report & Benefits

## Korean American Community Services





Since Public Health & Benefits became a separate department at KACS in April 2005, department staff have helped thousands of Korean Americans to address their health needs, especially those who are underinsured. KACS staff work hard to increase access to health services and to raise public awareness about pressing health issues affecting the Korean community. Current programs address osteoporosis, hepatitis B, tobacco cessation, menopause, immunization, and more.

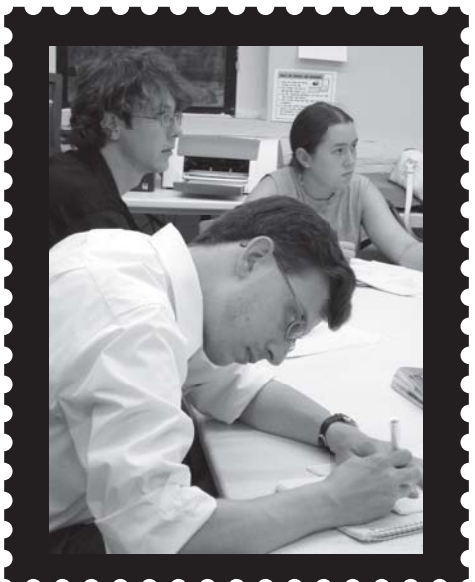
An exciting new project is the Breast & Cervical Cancer Early Detection Project, which provides outreach, education, screening, information and referrals to Korean American women. Case management is also provided to those who need further screenings and treatments in partnership with local hospitals.

KACS is dedicated to providing health-related services to the elderly. Happy cafe is one such program, designed to be a healthy, fun, and relaxing space for seniors aged 60 and older who may otherwise suffer from depression and loneliness. About 35 seniors participate in weekly sessions to drink tea and discuss change, happiness, relationships, power, family, and the value of existence.

KACS conducts an annual health fair in partnership with Swedish Covenant Hospital. Now in its 31st year, the health fair organizes volunteer Korean doctors and nurses to provide free and low-cost checkups, screenings and medication for more than 600 uninsured and underinsured Korean Americans each year. In addition, our case managers provide Outreach & Interpretation Services, which provide language assistance and information regarding Medicaid, Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), AllKids, Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP), and other public benefits.

## Community Education



KACS' Community Education programs provide opportunities for community members to gain basic life skills as well as to enrich their lives. Students from all around the world attend KACS' ESL/Civics classes to increase their proficiency in English and learn about the rights and responsibilities of living in the U.S. Classes focus on English for daily practical use, such as transportation, health, schools, and jobs. Citizenship classes provided another opportunity for immigrants to learn English, as well as study information necessary to pass the citizenship exam.

Adult computer classes are one of KACS' most popular Community Education programs. In the past year, over 330 students attended basic and intermediate classes held in Korean, Spanish and English, where they learned everything from how to click a mouse to creating an Excel spreadsheet. KACS' CTC (Computer Technology Center) provided public access for over 1,400 community members to practice computer skills, search for jobs, and surf the Internet for information.

Youth technology-based programs continued to be popular. Girls Get Digital held one session in the summer focusing on documentary/media literacy for young women, combining hands-on media projects with critical analysis of the impact of media in society. The Broadcast Arts after school program focused on audio production in the fall and video production in the spring.

# Wellness

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The goal of KACS' Wellness department is to help individuals find the support they need to achieve their personal goals. The department offers individual and group counseling services for a variety of issues such as domestic violence, neglect, addiction, cultural adjustment, inter-generational conflicts, and other life stresses.

Parenting Education - Effective parenting meets the child's needs according to prevailing cultural standards, which may change from generation to generation. Effective parenting delivered consistently throughout childhood enables attachment and fosters the child's sense of security, which is essential for subsequent mental health and self-esteem.

PACT (Parent and Child Together: Mommy and Me; Daddy and Me) - This on-going group will utilize Theraplay techniques to enhance secure attachment between child and primary caregiver. Securely attached children develop valuable coping skills such as resilience, social competence, flexibility, curiosity, and self-reliance.

Play Therapy Group - Play is a communication method of children. Participating children will have an opportunity to alleviate negative emotions and stress through play activities.

KACS' Wellness services are offered by experienced counselors and psychotherapists in Korean, Spanish, and English. With funding from the United Way, a Korean Family Information Needs Assessment has measured Korean immigrants' level of knowledge about U.S. institutions and processes, and identify major barriers and the impact of under-utilization on family lives.

In collaboration with the Korean American Bar Association(KABA), KACS continues to offer a monthly pro bono legal clinic where experienced attorneys provide advice on a wide array of legal issues. This is a critical resource for newly arrived immigrants, who are often unfamiliar with the U.S. legal system.

# Arts and Culture

Going beyond basic needs, KACS seeks to enrich the community's quality of life by providing multi-disciplinary arts programming including workshops, performances, and exhibitions of contemporary and traditional art forms in multiple media. As a predominantly immigrant community, Korean Americans have a unique opportunity to fuse traditions from a long and rich cultural heritage with the many diverse forms of artistic expression in the U.S. Programs include classes and workshops in digital photography, fashion design, papercraft, Korean cooking, and traditional Asian calligraphy.

Exhibitions have showcased historic Korean stamps, antique Korean household items, post-Korean War political cartoons, and paintings by children and youth. Community artists have opportunities to perform in projects such as our annual Youth Noontime Concert series. We are also committed to presenting high-quality events showcasing Korean and Korean American arts such as the exhibition entitled "Inner Fragrance" of Ki Ja Kim and Hung Sung Park's art works and Ahn Trio concert both in May 2008 in celebration of the Asian Heritage Month.





KACS' Senior Services is a multi-faceted program that assists Korean seniors in maintaining healthy and active lives. The main part of program revolves around two HUD-subsidized senior housing facilities in Albany Park that provide housing for 80 and 95 residents respectively. KACS offers case management services and a variety of programs such as health, exercise and fitness, recreational and educational activities. MooGoong Terrace, located at 4848 N. Kedzie, Chicago, opened in 1983; Koram Senior Housing, located at 4444 N. Harding, Chicago, opened in 1986.

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## Independent Auditors' Report

I have audited the accompanying statement of financial position of the Korean American Community Services (KACS), an Illinois not-for-profit organization, as of June 30, 2007, and related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the fiscal year then ended. These statements are the responsibility of KACS' management. My responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on my audit. The prior fiscal year summarized comparative information is derived from KACS' 2006 financial statements, which were audited by me. My report, dated November 21, 2006 expressed an unqualified opinion on those financial statements.

I conducted my audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that I plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. I believe my audit provides a reasonable basis for my opinion.

In my opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of KACS as of June 30, 2007, and the changes in its net assets and cash flows for the fiscal year then ended, in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, I have also issued a report dated January 4, 2008 on my consideration of KACS' internal control over financial reporting and my tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grants. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards and should be read in conjunction with this report in considering the results of my audit.

The accompanying schedule of federal awards expended is presented on page 14 for the purpose of additional analysis as required by the U.S. Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, *Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations*, and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, in my opinion, is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.
