Korean American Community Services (KACS) was founded in 1972 by a group of concerned Korean Americans who met to discuss solutions to the acute problems that Korean immigrants were experiencing upon arrival in the United States. Our mission is to serve Korean Americans and others who are in need of social, psychological, educational or economic support, and to provide assistance in the immigration and acculturation process, thus to encourage them to live dignified and meaningful lives.

KACS currently serves more than 7,500 clients per year through comprehensive services across the life cycle, including:

Welcome

The KACS **Early Childhood Center**, founded in 1979, is a place that treasures and nourishes our community's most precious resources: our children. Combining learning with interactive activities, our certified teachers prepare daily lessons, field trips, excursions to beautiful Homer Park, arts and crafts, and a miscellany of other activities designed to provide a supportive, enriching environment for children from diverse backgrounds.

Children come from various backgrounds, and as a result, the rich cultural performances presented by the children during the Culture Show in May are always a delight to watch. Other events include

the Pre-school graduation in August and a Christmas party at the end of each year. KACS is also responsive to the needs of the entire family, providing counseling, health and nutrition screenings, and parenting education workshops.



Early Childhood Center



KACS after-school program tries to achieve that by providing a safe place for children to learn and play. It also provides guidance, support, and a variety of opportunities that will contribute to the healthy development of young people. The after-school program began in February of 1990 as a part of the KACS Early Childhood Center. It offers various academic and non-academic activities to facilitate the development of the following areas: cognitive, social and moral.



Department of **Community Education and Support** provides assistance to our community members with:

Immigration Services – KACS has assisted nearly 500 Koreans at varying stages of the immigration and citizenship process with various services. KACS has been participating in the New Americans Initiative which is an unprecedented state program, administered by the Illinois Coalition for Immigration helping legal permanent residents become U.S. citizens. Some of the free services range from citizenship preparation to application assistance, civics classes, and legal screenings.

Housing Resource Center- We advocate for affordable housing and a suitable living environment for low to moderate income households. Information and referrals are provided through workshops and presentations presented in Korean, Spanish, and English.

Financial Education Program – The goal of financial literacy program is to provide culturally and linguistically appropriate services in assisting Korean and Latino immigrants and other residents of Albany Park to access various financial information.

Employment Counseling and Placement Services program - This program at KACS has been providing a wide variety of employment services to help clients seek out jobs in English, Spanish, and Korean. KACS has placed over 10,000 job seekers in gainful employment since 1972. Job Search Resources and Training opportunities are also available to assist clients in the search for employment.

Low Income Taxpayer Clinic (LITC) Program - This program is a far-reaching community campaign to educate taxpayers who speak English as a second language (ESL) by utilizing various economic, social and cultural networks and resources.

Computer skills trainings - KACS' Community Technology Center (CTC) serves over about 1,500 low-income and immigrant populations that face numerous barriers to computer access and require substantial technology training a year. Public access to the CTC is free of charge including printing, internet access, and technical support from the CTC staff. In view of the technology training, KACS has enhanced our programs with the Internet and Computing Core Certification (IC3).

ESL/Civics classes - KACS offers a couple of different language classes including English, Korean and Spanish. The mission of ESL/Civics/Citizenship classes is to reduce barriers for predominantly immigrants and low income families with limited English proficiency to achieve equal opportunity and further improve their quality of life. Our citizenship classes provide immigrants not only languages skills but also practical information and confidence which they need to navigate U.S. society and eventually improve the quality of their lives.

Youth Art & Technology programs - KACS has developed our Summer Youth Art Camp & Work programs with digital literacy programs, utilizing two computer labs. KACS Summer Youth Art & Technology programs directly addressed the digital divide and the No Child Left Behind legislation by providing not only basic computer literacy but also working knowledge of computer, graphic/web design that appeal to future employers. Each group has different goal to break out digital literacy such as getting familiar with MS PowerPoint, MS Publisher, Adobe Photoshop, Macromedia Dreamweaver.

Arts and Culture

KACS CULTURAL ARTS: ROOT EAST/ROOT WEST

KACS provides Root East, Root West, multi-disciplinary arts and cultural programming targeting the underserved population in arts including the Korean American community in the Chicago metropolitan area. Programming includes workshops in various visual arts, performances, and exhibitions of contemporary and traditional art forms in multiple media, summer youth art camp, language classes such as Korean and Spanish. KACS views arts as a vital component of a vibrant, healthy community and culture through languages as tools to empower and enrich cultural competency. We reach out to the community through over 70 workshops and classes for underserved population throughout a year. This year, more than 500 people with their family members enjoyed our workshops. The Christmas tree decoration at the Museum of Science and Industry by our senior craft class became a year project. 26 adults take Spanish language class and 184 adults were benefited by KACS Korean language class for last 4 years.

Community Health Programs

The **Community Health Department (CHD)** has been the primary vehicle for organizing, coordinating and providing federal, state, community-based health services and opportunities for our neighborhoods. Annually, more than 2000 people have benefited from our health programs and services.

The services that the CHD provide are:

- 1) Health Screening Center & Health Seminar - affordable, consistent and basic health screening services to the population, who are not eligible for any health care access.
- 2) Breast and Cervical Cancer Early Detection Project - outreach, education, free screening, information and referral for breast and cervical cancer; and case management for the awareness of breast and cervical cancer.
- 3) Building Better Bones Project - outreach, education, risk assessment and bone density screening for osteoporosis.
- 4) Hepatitis B Education & Vaccination Program - identifying individuals and families at risk for Hepatitis-B infection and increasing the knowledge of Hepatitis-b and its prevention.
- 5) Spring Health Fair - Free Health Screenings – a wide range of free health screenings for our community.
- 6) Annual Health Fair in Fall - Since 1977, annual health fair has been conducted collaborate with Swedish Covenant Hospital. Through this health fair, more than 20000 underinsured and uninsured Korean people have chance to receive appropriate medical exams.
- 7) Flu Shot
- 8) All KIDS/ Family Care & WIC Assistance
- 9) Body & Mind Practice (Kouksundo) - improving life-management skills. Kouksundo is a several thousand –year-old Korean breathing exercise.



2009 Korean American Community Services Wellness Program

The goal of KACS' **Wellness** department is to help individuals within the community find the support they need to achieve their personal goals. The department offers individual and group counseling services for a variety of issues such as domestic violence and acculturation problems. Crisis Intervention services address a broad range of psychological and social problems. Individuals facing a crisis or an emergency can experience a wide range of physical and emotional consequences from the stress and trauma of dealing with the crisis.

- **Parenting Education** Effective parenting is the process that adequately meets the child's needs, according to prevailing cultural standards, which changes from generation to generation. Effective parenting delivered consistently over childhood enables attachment and fosters the child's sense of security, which is essential for subsequent mental health and self-esteem.

- **Domestic Violence Support Group for Victims** This support group is offered in Spanish to those who are going or have gone through physical abuse, verbal, emotional, or sexual abuse at the hands of their partners, former partners, or family members. This support group is designed to offer support and education about the dynamics of abuse and to provide the tools to rebuild self-esteem.

- **Anxiety Group for Teens** This group is offered in English and Korean to adolescents who are dealing with transitions in their life due to acculturation. Through this group, the participants will be able to communicate effectively with their parents and describe the particular challenges that they face on a day to day basis as immigrant youth.

In collaboration with the Korean American Bar Association (KABA), KACS continues to offer a monthly pro bono legal clinic where experienced attorneys provide advice on a wide array of legal issues.



2009 Korean American Community Services Housing and Senior Services

KACS' **Housing and Senior Services** focuses on Korean American seniors so that they have the resources to live full, active, and healthy lives by managing basic necessities, such as housing, to social activities, such as Happy Café program.

So that Korean American seniors can manage comfortable and active lives, KACS develops, operates, and manages safe and pleasant apartment buildings

- Moogoong Apartment Senior Housing Management
- Koram Apartment Senior Housing Management
- Senior Housing Development and Information Referral

Also, in order to lower the barriers in utilizing public benefits programs among Korean seniors, we conduct outreach and interpretation services, which provide language assistance and information regarding Medicaid, Food Stamps, Medicare, Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program, and so on.

KACS provides an elderly depression prevention program "Happy Café"—a space for seniors aged 60 and older who may otherwise suffer from depression and loneliness to meet and freely talk about personal or social issues and the specific ways they are affected. The meetings rely upon honestly sharing opinions so that sincere and genuine relationships may develop. 58 seniors participated in weekly sessions to drink tea and discuss aging, happiness, relationships, stress management, and coping skills.

Independent Auditors' Report

I have audited the accompanying statement of financial position of the Korean American Community Services (KACS), an Illinois not-for-profit organization, as of June 30, 2008, and related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the fiscal year then ended. These statements are the responsibility of KACS' management. My responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on my audit. The prior fiscal year summarized comparative information is derived from KACS' 2007 financial statements, which were audited by me. My report, dated January 4, 2008 expressed an unqualified opinion on those financial statements.

I conducted my audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that I plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. I believe my audit provides a reasonable basis for my opinion.

In my opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of KACS as of June 30, 2008, and the changes in its net assets and cash flows for the fiscal year then ended, in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, I have also issued a report dated December 22, 2008 on my consideration of KACS' internal control over financial reporting and my tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grants. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards and should be read in conjunction with this report in considering the results of my audit.

The accompanying schedule of federal awards expended is presented on page 15 for the purpose of additional analysis as required by the U.S. Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, *Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations*, and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, in my opinion, is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.
